The extensive array of bush roses, hybrid teas, floribundas, grandifloras, and climbers blends elegantly with the garden's formal architectural design to create a memorable showcase landscape.

The Seattle Sensory Garden is designed for those with and without disabilities to enjoy. A variety of elements encourage guests to touch and explore at their leisure, including deep-toned wind chimes, temple bells, and guiros—rectangular wooden posts with slots that create noise when touched. An accessible paved pathway, special sensory-friendly carpeting, and raised beds make for easier interaction with the variety of trees, shrubs and bulbs planted throughout the garden.
