Last year marked the 100th anniversary of the opening of the Rose Garden, a glorious setting for all to stroll the grass pathways circulating through 21/2 acres of rose displays. The extensive array of bush roses, hybrid teas. floribundas, grandifloras, and climbers blends elegantly with the garden's formal architectural design for a memorable showcase landscape.

Inside the Rose Garden, the Seattle Sensory Garden is designed for those with and without disabilities to enjoy. A variety of elements encourages guests to touch and explore at their leisure, including deep-toned wind chimes, temple bells and guiros—rectangular wooden posts with slots that create noise when touched. An accessible paved pathway, special sensoryfriendly carpeting, and raised beds make for easier interaction with the variety of trees, shrubs and bulbs planted throughout the garden.
